Fabric and Fibre Lesson with 3rd to 4th Classes 'Wonderful Weaving'

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Curriculum Strand: Fabric and Fibre (Visual Arts Curriculum p.58)

Objective: Explore the possibilities of fabric and fibre as media for imaginative expression

Make small inventive pieces in fabric and fibre (p.58)

Developing this Activity in Class:

Getting Started: Look at the 'Weaving with Fibres' programme on the DVD and see how the

children weave simple, colourful wall hangings using a simple card loom. Look at 'Make a Loom' in the 'Can You?' section of the I Am An Artist website with the class and help them to construct individual looms with

card and string.

Materials Needed: A4 sheets of strong card

String

A variety of wools

A variety of fabrics cut into narrow strips

Ribbons, laces, threads

Stimulus: Seasonal Colours — "What colours can we see to let us know that

Spring/Summer/Autumn/Winter has arrived? What Festival is celebrated during Spring/Summer/Autumn/Winter? What flowers/fruits do we associate with this season? What weather do we associate with it? Think about all these things and see if you could put them together to weave a

wall hanging about aspects of this season."

Activity: The children decide on the fabric strips, wools, ribbons and any other

fibres they are going to use for their weaving. Encourage them to be adventurous with their choice of textures and colours, keeping aspects of the particular season in mind. They might like to weave dried grasses or flowers into the piece too. When they have finished, remove the piece from the loom and display in the classroom or other suitable place in the

school.

Evaluation/Looking and Responding:

This will be happening as the children work. Encourage them to talk about what they are doing, about the yarns chosen and what they think about

the textures and colour scheme they have created. If possible show them samples of woven fabric, e.g., woollen rugs/blankets, chunky scarves, tweeds. Ask them to respond to the tapestries by Le Brocquy and Miro.

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Extension Activities: The children could make weavings following patterns of their own design

to make belts, headbands depicting local team colours or other items.

<u>ICT Possibilities</u>: The Victoria and Albert Museum gives children the opportunity to design a

textile!
