Rowan Gillespie (b. 1953) The Victim, 1997 Bronze, 8 x 7 x 9.5in

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Suitability: Senior Cycle- Art History, Senior Cycle- Pottery, Junior Cycle- 3D craft Theme: Voiceless People Around the World Topic: Ceramics/ Pottery

The Victim is a representation of of all the millions of people that died from starvation and disease, or who emigrated.Gillespie says this piece "is about the miracle of human life in a galaxy of indifference".

Questions

Looking at Rowan Gillespie's 'The Victim'

- 1. What do you feel when you look at this piece?
- 2. How do you think the figure in the sculpture feels?
- 3. Who do you think this person might be?
- 4. What do you notice when you look closely at the face?
- 5. Why do you think Gillespie decided to not give the figure eyes? And to block off the ears and nose?
- 6. What might this symbolise?
- 7. What do you think it was made from?
- 8. Do you think he would have used the additive or subtractive method to create the sculpture?
- 9. Why do you think Gillespie made this piece of work?
- 10. Do you think it is important to make work with a strong historical/political attachment?

Project (5-6 weeks)

- 1. Read newspapers and news apps until you find a topic that you feel strongly about. Make sure that it relates to the theme of voiceless people.
- 2. Research the topic and record findings through drawings. These findings could be photos, stories or quotes that you turn into imagery or primary source photography if possible.
- 3. Write down as many words as you can think of that best describe your voiceless person on an A2 page.
- 4. Draw an image to go with each descriptive word creating a visual mind map.
- 5. Begin designing your ceramic piece keeping the emotions of your person to the forefront of your design.
- 6. Create your piece using air drying or ceramic clay.
- 7. Present to the class when complete talking them through your design process and answering questions.

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Activity (2 or 3 classes)

- 1. Pick a common situation that happens to many teenagers your age.
- 2. Think about the emotions involved.
- 3. Create a series of gestural charcoal drawings of a model in different positions which convey these various emotions.
- 4. Reflect on these drawings. Decide what specific positions/ movements are vital to conveying certain emotions.
- 5. Create a large A1 piece redrawing and overlapping your favorite sketches in order to create a piece which is full of movement, chaos and feeling.
