Bernadette Devlin was born in Cookstown, Co. Tyrone in 1947 to a Catholic family. While a student at Queen's University, Belfast she became active in left wing politics and the civil rights movement. In April 1969 she was elected as MP for mid-Ulster in a by-election. She stood for Independent Unity and was running against Anna Forrest of the Unionist Party, who was the widow of former MP George Forrest. She was the youngest woman ever elected to Westminster.
