Activity 2



Watch the clip 'Derry riots and destruction' (1969) and answer the questions below.

The first five minutes (approx.) of the clip show footage of rioting and damage caused to the streets of Derry during the so-called **Battle of the Bogside**.

The remainder of the clip contains interviews with civil rights activists Ivan Cooper and Eddie McAteer.
