MAY FLOWERS

- May Flowers were picked on the evening before May Day.
- The flowers were placed on the doorsteps of houses and on windowsills.
- They were believed to offer luck to the house and offer protection from mystical forces.
- Neighbours would wish their neighbours well by leaving flowers on each others doorsteps.



MAY BUSH

- The May Bush was a decorated bush.
- The bush was often of hawthorn.
- The decoration usually consisted of ribbons, cloth streamers and perhaps tinsel.



MAY BOUGH

- The May Bough was a larger version of the May Bush.
- It was often carried from house to house.
- It was similarly decorated to the May Bush.
- It was a sign of summer starting and to kept evil spirits away from the house.



MAY QUEEN

- The May Queen was a young girl crowned with flowers.
- She was paraded through the streets to welcome the summer.
- Some places had a May King and even a May baby.
- The May Queen symbolised our youth, our summer and our future.



THE EVIL EYE

- The Evil Eye was a really strong belief in Ireland and people tried to protect themselves from the evil eye.
- The evil eye was an envy/evil look from someone that could result in your crops failing, a cow dying or your churn wouldn't produce butter.



GALE DAY

 The first of May was a traditional date on which tenant farmers paid the rent to their landlords.
