### Construction Lesson with Infants to 6th Classes 'Scrunched Paper Constructions'

#### **Developing this Activity in Class:**

Before I start an art lesson I find it very helpful to do a little exercise with the children to unlock their imaginations and to create a safe environment in the classroom for them to show and discuss their work without fear of ridicule. Mankind's imagination got us out of the caves and onto the moon!! Anything can happen in our imagination if we only let it! "Close your eyes and imagine a big door. It can be any colour you like. Written across the door in big capital letters is the word IMAGINATION. Now reach out and slowly open the door, let your imagination out! Open your eyes and let me see the sparkle! Now we can do anything, our imaginations are at work and we are all different!"

Materials Needed: Paper

> Card Crayons Glue or PVA

Shallow containers for the glue e.g. Pringle lids

Stimulus: The materials

This activity starts with the children filling an A4 sheet of paper with Activity:

rubbings of various surfaces in the classroom, e.g., table tops, chairs, soles of shoes, floors, walls, Lego blocks, stickle bricks, bags, etc. Introduce the word 'texture' and encourage the children to feel surfaces for different textures and to describe them. Change the colour of the crayon for each surface and try rubbing different colours on each other. Ask the children to describe what happens when the two colours meet. When the page is full seat the children again and get them to look at their page. "When you look at all these textures what do you think about? Do they remind you of anything you have seen before? Can you see all the textures you rubbed? Feel them, can you describe the feel of the page? Now, we are going to work some magic! We are going to change this sheet of paper from a 2D to a 3D! Scrunch your page up into a ball and squeeze

it as hard as you can. Squeeze it harder! Open it out and feel it. Does it feel the same? How have we changed the paper? What have we done to the texture? Squeeze it up tightly again. Now, let us close our eyes and open the door to our imagination. When we open out the ball of paper, very slowly, something wonderful will happen. There is something in this ball of paper that only you can find, it could be anything! Watch it carefully and turn it in your hand. When it reminds you of something, stop opening it and look very carefully". When the children suggest a form (it could be an animal, a toy, a person, a place, the list is endless), glue it on the card and suggest to the child that he/she draws in the place or setting for their discovery. I realise that this is an abstract idea and hard to visualise, so I am including some pictures of paper constructions that children have made. You can see how different the ideas are and how wonderfully creative the children are with just a ball of coloured paper! ## Evaluation/Looking and Responding:

This will be happening as the children work. Encourage them to look carefully as they open the paper. Some children may need to ball the paper a few times before something emerges for them. When they have stuck the construction down and drawn in a background give them time to show their discoveries to each other and encourage them to ask questions of each other.

### **Extension Activities:**

Children love this activity and enjoy trying to find new things by changing textures and colours. They can also use scraps of fabrics to add to their constructions.

#### **ICT Possibilities:**

The children might like to scan in photos of their constructions and write a little story about them on the computer.

Note: I love doing this lesson with all classes in the school as it really frees up

the children's imagination and they get great joy from seeing their ideas emerge in a tangible form. I find that using a finger to stick the paper with PVA rather than glue spreaders is much easier. Past experience of trails of glue from the spreaders has coloured my use of them. The children like peeling the dried glue from their fingers and the tidy up is

much quicker and far less messy.
